2026 Membership Renewal Info

The 2026 renewals have been mailed out. I If you have not already received, send me a email and I can email you the forms or you can pick forms up at the club.

The renewals are due back no later than the February 2nd Membership Meeting to avoid a \$30.00 late charge.

In the envelope will be your information cover sheet, work sheet, Release Indemnification Agreement form and NRA Form (if applies to you), and a return envelope.

Double check the information cover sheet and make any corrections necessary. Return your information cover sheet with your work sheet, release form, NRA form and the work hour portion of your membership card. Keep the front half of your membership card with you until you receive your 2026 card.

The Release Indemnification Form is required by our insurance company. <u>It must be returned and signed to receive your new membership card. This also applies to associates if they would like a card.</u> The form has space for both of you to sign and a area to list children.

On the worksheet don't forget to fill in your NRA dues and the yearly archery and range fees if you would like them. The **MUCC dues are \$5.00**. **NOTE:** The \$25.00 option to receive the magazine by mail is no longer available as an add on. We were told about this change the beginning of November after the forms were printed so ignore the \$25.00 option.

Please check that all information is filled out, addition is correct and everything required is in return envelope. PRINT NEATLY AND LEGIBLY.

Allow a couple weeks after you mail back or drop off before you see your new card. They will be processed in order I receive them. It takes approximately 15 minutes to process each renewal. Still working full time so I am not at the club everyday. Your check will be held until I process your renewal, then giving to Kim to deposit.

Adult Indoor Archery

The Winter Indoor League will begin on January 8, 2026. It will run for 12 weeks. The cost will be \$40 for WWCCA members and \$50 for non-members. Sign up will be done on the first night, there is no preregistration.

This is open to shooters of all skill levels. Compound and Recurve archery equipment only (no crossbows).

We shoot from 18M, at vertical 3 spot targets for compound and 40cm for recurve. This year, shooters will have the option for 60 or 30 arrows per session.

Junior Archery Development

The Junior Archery Development program is open to any youth archer aged 8 to 20, from beginners to advanced. Students can shoot barebow, Olympic recurve, as well as compound bows and the club provides recurve bows, arrows, and safety equipment. We teach the fundamentals of range safety and proper shooting form from the basics of shooting bow to more advanced techniques as they develop and will earn achievement awards along the way to track their progress. We offer a summer outdoor class that runs June through August and a winter indoor class that runs January through March – always Tuesday evenings.

Registration for the upcoming winter indoor program started Sunday December 7th in the club house. Classes run every Tuesday evening starting January 6th through March 31st. We will only have one session (6 to 8pm) with a limit of 30 students.

I'm taking off my cowboy hat to talk about legislative news.

Our Anti Gun Governess and Nanny Gretchen Whitler decided to call gun violence a public health issue and funded a MDHHS study on "Gun Violence and It's Solutions." The full report can be found here. https://www.michigan.gov/mdhhs/-/media/Project/Websites/mdhhs/Inside-MDHHS/Newsroom/Michigan-Gun-Violence-Prevention-Task-Force.pdf

Needless to say, it will do nothing to address gun violence, but reads as a gun banners Christmas present wish list.

To Summarize. It's all couched in terms of "with lives on the line" and "something must be done", and the rationale is the other leftist states do this, so Michigan should do this too. Never mind that the Supreme Court has ruled several of these bans unconstitutional. Here are the 9 major points that would turn into democrat party legislation.

FARequiring waiting periods for all firearm purchases.

- 2. Increasing the age of firearm purchase to 21
- 3. A prohibition on the possession of large capacity magazines.
- 4. Requiring gun dealer licensing, record keeping and inspections at the state level (a version of this was introduced in the 2025/2026 legislative session). This creates a state version of the ATF to further regulate and decrease FFL's.
- 5. Ban ghost guns (a version of this was introduced in the 2025/2026 legislative session).
- 6. Allowing for legal accountability for the gun industry. This violates Federal Lawful commerce act.
- 7. A prohibition of gun carriage in government buildings (a version of this was introduced in the 2025/2026 legislative session). They are afraid of us being armed in the statehouse. How it solves gun violence in the cities unknown.
- 8. A prohibition on the sale, possession, manufacture or transfer of assault weapons. This is a SemiAuto Rifle Ban. Also they cannot define what an Assault weapon is. How can a government that can't define what a woman is define what an Assault weapon is?
- 9. A ban on automatic conversion devices (a version of this was introduced in the 2025-2026 legislative session). This is a ban on already illegal "Glock Switches" and Legal Bump Stocks.

So what can you do? Call, Write, email your state representative and your State Senators and voice your opposition to any and all these recommendations.

Black Powder

January 1,1776 -184 days to the Declaration of Independence. The Boston Massacre, Boston Tea Party and "the shot heard around the world" have already occurred. There is continued colonial frustration with British policies like the Stamp Act and Townshend Acts. Colonial forces under the command of George Washington continue their siege of Boston and the British Troops occupying it.

On January 1, 1776, British ships under Lord Dunmore, governor of Virginia, bombard the town of Norfolk, Virginia. Since April of 1775 and the battles at Concord and Lexington, Patriots and Tories have clashed over British attempts to confiscate gunpowder and flintlocks stored throughout the colony. Battles between British troops and American militia has led to Dunmore's withdrawal from Norfolk onto British ships in the harbor. Norfolk is under American control. Commanding those forces is Colonel Robert Howe (not to be confused with General Howe who was at this time in command of the British forces in the colonies). The American forces had denied provisions to the British ships. They were also a little cocky parading themselves on the wharves of Norfollk and using the warehouses there to snipe at British soldiers and sailors. Unknown to Lord Dunmore the Americans had already decided that they could not defend the city from the ships and the troops on them. So when the British began to bomb the wharves the Americans helped the conflagration along by also setting fires. The decision had been made to "leave nothing for the British". Particularly so as the local merchants were vocal Tories (colonist loyal to the King in this dispute). The assistance of the militia in burning Norfolk was not really known for sometime after the event. Therefore the burning of Norfolk was widely used as an example of what happens under tyrannical rule to recruit supporters of the revolution.

January 2. The Continental Congress passes a resolution, known as the "Tory Act", which outlines how colonies should manage Loyalists, recommending that they be disarmed and the most dangerous among them held in custody.

January 5. New Hampshire becomes the first colony to adopt a State Constitution, an important step in replacing British authority with locally created government.

January 10. Thomas Paine's influential pamphlet Common Sense was published. It was written in clear simple language to argue for the independence of the Thirteen Colonies from British rule. It was widely read and very persuasive.

January 20. South Carolina Loyalist, led by Robert Cunningham, sign a petition from prison, agreeing to all demands for peace by the formed state government of South Carolina. In essence they lament the divisions created amongst the people over independence, apologize for their having taken the wrong view in that dispute, and promise to behave like good Patriots should they be released. The majority are taken for their word and are released. Several are not trusted and remain in prison.

January 24. In May of 1775, Ethan Allen and his Green Mountain Boys, together with Benedict Arnold commanding volunteers from Connecticut and Massachusetts, surprised and overtook a small British garrison at Fort Ticonderoga. Later, under orders from General Washington, Henry Knox would travel to the fort, organize and lead a removal of the 59 artillery pieces from the fort, packing them up, pulling them with oxen over 300 miles through frozen lands to deliver them to Boston. There Washington would the artillery mounted on Dorchester Heights, overlooking Boston and force a British evacuation of the city March 17, 1776.

The march towards declaring independence continued.

Now the Tonquish Muzzleloaders events for January 2026 are: Our monthly walkthrough is on January 4th and our monthly meeting is January 8th. The big event for January is the Wintering. We will be camping from the 23rd to the 25th with the shooting competition on Saturday 12ish. The event is \$15 for the weekend. The shooting match is for muzzleloaders with a patched roundball only. This is a more casual event then our Rendezvous but period correct clothing is encouraged. Except boots can be modern.

On another note, Robbie Burns Day is the 25th but we will probably celebrate the great bard on the 24th with a poem and a toast. I doubt we will wear the kilts but you never know.

Old man winter is not giving up any time soon, so if we want to keep warm, we will then have to carry our own heat — pun intended . . . again U I can help warm up your thoughts by having you start to think about the upcoming handgun season. But first, it is time for our 2026 Annual Handgun meeting. It will be held in February, the meeting date and the handgun event dates will be announced once the club finalizes the 2026 calendar.

The purpose of our handgun meeting is to finalize the 2026 handgun season details. We need to agree to the rules & procedures and hold our annual elections for chairman. Rather than a routine carryover of the rules from 2025, we are hoping for some good discussions with our seasoned & new shooters. We want to make sure there is nothing overlooked that needs addressing. We want to keep what worked and review those areas that can be improved. In the spring of 2025 we confirmed that stop watches were the appropriate tool for our Pin and Falling Plate events. There will be a structured agenda that will include feedback from the group as a key part of the process. A draft agenda will be sent to all those on our Handgun email distribution list. - Security Chairman MUST be notified of all new locks being installed on the club property so the above procedure can be followed.


